Support for a Clean Electricity Standard


- 2018 IPCC report indicates global emissions from electricity must be reduced by 70% by 2030
- NJ's Energy Master Plan calls for a Clean Electricity Standard





New Jersey Policies

- Clean Renewable Energy Act of 2018 called for 50% Clean Renewable Energy (solar and wind) by 2030
- 2018 established support for nuclear energy
- Together with the clean renewable energy bill, we get to 88-94% from clean energy resources by 2030
- Governor Murphy signs EO 315 calling for 100% clean electricity by 2035
- Legislative efforts to codify 100% by 2035





Clean Energy Sources

- Most recent PJM capacity auction saw a price increase of \$329/MW-day a
 22% surge from the previous record.
- New Jersey's capacity costs could increase from \$2-3 billion to nearly \$15
 billion for the 2025-2026 period
- Cost surge largely driven by:
 - Aging fossil fuel infrastructure
 - PJM's failure to correct clean energy projects
- PJM's interconnection queue is broken
 - 77 projects stalled in NJ 50% are clean energy projects
 - Backlog often exceeds five years
- A5463/S4363 ("PJM Transparency Bill") signed into law
 - Requires electric public utilities to submit annual reports on PJM voting to the BPU.
- Offshore wind projects stalled or stopped completely in New Jersey
- Solar: S4100








Northeast Supply Enhancement Pipeline

- Williams Transco's proposed NESE natural gas pipeline has returned after previously being denied multiple times and proven unnecessary
- NESE would construct a new compressor station in Franklin and build new pipeline through Old Bridge, Sayreville, and Raritan Bay
- Ongoing grassroots and legal efforts to urge FERC, NYDEC, and NJDEP to deny this pipeline again





Defining Clean Energy

- Trash incineration currently receives class II RECs
- These facilities are exclusively located in EJ communities
- Advocated since last year that trash incineration should not be in the definition of clean
- New Jersey LCV has been working with EJ groups and closely with the bill sponsor to ensure trash incineration is removed from that clean energy definition





The Data Center Piece

- Data centers are sending power bills soaring across New Jersey by increasing usage without increasing capacity
- Data centers are buying up massive amounts of energy, driving up cost
- S4143 requires data centers to have their own energy usage plan derived from clean energy sources





Goal: Pass the 100% by '35 bill in lameduck

- Executive Order 315
- The hill is getting steeper
- Offshore wind company Orsted pulled out of their project Nov 1st
- > Labor groups are withholding support
- Working with environmental champions in the legislature, environmental orgs, EJ groups, and on compromises with labor groups

: Bill will move through:

- Senate Environment and Energy (Chair is the prime sponsor of the bill*)
- Then likely Senate Budget & Appropriations (Sarlo)
- Assembly Telecommunications and Utilities (DeAngelo*)
- Then likely Assembly Appropriations (Swain*):

* = New Jersey LCV endorsees



How You Can Help

Climate Superfund Act

- Imposes liability on certain fossil fuel companies for certain damages caused by climate change
- New York and Vermont have passed Climate Superfund laws
- Aiming for lame duck passage





NJPACT Rules Update

- NJPACT REAL Rules
 – a slate of regulations to combat the impacts of climate change in NJ
- New 'Notice of Substantial Change' regarding the rules
- Comment period ended September 19th
