Using real-world case studies — including campaigns addressing food waste reduction, construction dust mitigation, and leaf blower bans — participants will explore how advocates built public support, worked with municipal officials, navigated policy development, and achieved meaningful outcomes.

Food, Turf, and Water: A 2026 Policy Update
